

Field Journal Check

You are asked to maintain a field journal that charts your individual learning path as you develop an understanding of the ancient arts of the Americas. While it is acceptable to include your class notes, the Field Journal is intended to be much more, including the following, but not limited to: a glossary of new terms; maps; diagrams of complex concepts, styles, and strategies; illustrations of works; and floor plans of complexes and temples encountered in course readings and class discussions.

Field Journals will be submitted at the midterm for an evaluation of the contents, their relevancy to course material, completeness, effort, and the demonstration of learning. Organization of the journal should facilitate its use as a reference guide, and demonstrate, or make reference to your contributions to the Compendium of Knowledge. Field Journals will be collected and reviewed again at the close of the second exam, on May 16.
